hoever stops by the Junior League building will see one of these ladies who are always ready with a smile and willingness to assist with whatever needs attending. With the focus on the Centennial being about the 100 years of service and longevity of members committing to the organization to uphold the mindset of building partnerships to better Birmingham, we need a constant presence in the midst of dynamic changing of leadership and serving roles among over 2,000 members each year. We members and community partners rely heavily on these four ladies who are the constant presence and heart of the JLB.

In giving her perspective about the Junior League of Birmingham, Missy Fooshee commented that having spent her entire career in nonprofit accounting, it is impressive that the Junior League continues to attract such dedicated members, considering the size of the organization. Ten years ago, the League was primarily comprised of non-working women.

But that is certainly not the case today, with 95% or more of the membership being women employed outside the home. To be able to recruit and retain members who are willing to invest their time, not only for the duration of their membership, but also to meet service hour requirements, while working full-time jobs, is truly commendable. This speaks volumes about the organization and the positive impact it has on the lives of its members and the community.

Missy further stated, "I believe it's crucial for all members to understand that everything we do in the Junior League touches finance, whether it's raising funds or allocating them to the community, strategic planning, volunteer hours, or even the more esoteric aspects like the audited financials and tax returns. The latter becomes public information, so we must ensure accuracy and transparency. While I don't need to be involved in every detail, it's vital to comprehend how committees work together and how everything ultimately flows through the financial statements. It may not be apparent to non-financial individuals, but it's crucial to ensure the organization's success. I work closely with Bailey, who oversees development and grants, and we cannot survive without each other. As a team, we appreciate the connection between finance and everything we do more than any other group I've worked with, and it's gratifying to me. We have a solid team here." Camaraderie is apparent among the staff, along with a genuine respect for one another.

Bailey Duke looked thoughtful as she gave her input: "Adding to Missy's thoughts, we work hand in hand to create a seamless process with finance, fund development, and community so members can create and execute amazing fundraisers, carry out twenty-plus community placements every year, and more. Presbyterian Church, where they once had to cancel the meeting so as not to disturb the pastor.

In 1951, JLB bought a Southside building to house both the Speech and Hearing Center and the JLB. But in 1956, when the Speech and Hearing Center moved to the Medical Center, JLB was homeless again. It was not until an abandoned warehouse was purchased in 1958 that the JLB had a permanent place to call home.

By the late 1980s, the JLB membership had swelled and outgrown its converted-warehouse headquarters. A capital campaign was mounted with JLB members and community leaders working together to raise money necessary to construct the new headquarters building, which opened its doors on Thursday, 27 April 1989.

Maddie Henkey Maluff leaned in. "Membership is the core of everything we do," she emphasized. "Without members, there wouldn't be an organization. As the Member Liaison for the staff, I am here to help make your experience the best it can be. We are all here to support you and help you grow."

The main goal is member satisfaction, and Maddie is dedicated to helping in any way possible, whether it's addressing issues with digital resources, ensuring members receive credit for their work, or providing technical support during meetings. "Interacting with members is the best part of my job," she added.

Maddie spoke on behalf of Missy, Bailey, and Katherine: "In summary, remember that we are here to help. Don't hesitate to reach out if you need anything at all. At the end of the day, we want to do anything we can to help make your experience with the League a positive one."



The Junior League has a long history of being an organization of community-minded women who are accomplished not only in their professional lives but also driven to give back in service where needed. For the next 100 years, I would like to see the League continue to promote the philanthropic message in a way that reaches both men and women. the Centennial shirt

o commemorate the 100th anniversary, the Centennial shirt was designed for members of the Junior League of Birmingham. The rich history of our city and dedication of the League intertwined to reveal the significant meaning.

A curated timeline design outlines the story beginning with Sloss Furnace, the historic landmark that pays homage to the birth of Birmingham. Founded on the iron ore industry during the late 1800s, a vibrant city emerged and became so prosperous in its boom it was nicknamed the Magic City.

In addition to being the region's leading industrial city, Alabama banking pioneer, Harry Brock, was instrumental in making Birmingham one of the nation's largest banking centers, which transformed the city's skyline. The addition of numerous headquarters including the previously named AmSouth Harbert Plaza, First National Bank (Regions Center), and the AT&T City Center, which anchor the downtown city center, are symbolized by the two of the tallest buildings on the timeline design, next

to the centrally featured Vulcan, Roman god of fire and metalworking, who is considered the patron deity of Birmingham. Vulcan stands as an iconic symbol of the city's magic and industrial heritage, rising high on the horizon of the iron ore ridge of Red Mountain and towering over the surrounding landscape. Its presence is a testament to the city's rich history and enduring

legacy.

The design also incorporates the image of the JLB building that was constructed in 1988. Serving as the Junior League of Birmingham's headquarters, it has become a part of Birmingham's skyline and signifies the League's longstanding presence in the community and its commitment to supporting the city's growth and progress. The image visually represents from where we have come and where we are going, by rounding out the skyline with Constance, the Centennial mascot, who holds a forging tool in one hand and a light to guide the way in the other.

The color of the shirt being black helped introduce the newest JLB fundraiser, Little Black Dress Initiative in the spring of 2022, which allows for members to further spread the light in the community, sharing who we are and what we do for the city. The Centennial shirt has been worn throughout the yearlong festivities raising awareness and serving as a representation of the Junior League of Birmingham's values, its connection to the city's history, and its commitment to forging a better future for Birmingham and its citizens. ®

Early 1900s saw women across America organizing to meet needs and make a difference in their communities. 19-year-old Mary Harriman established the original Junior League in New York City.

In Birmingham, the Volunteer Relief group from St. Mary's Church focused on supporting servicemen fighting at the Mexican-American border. After the war ended, Volunteer Relief begar raising money for Children's Hospital. Around the same time, the ladies of Mrs. Shook's Group were involved in similar work.

After Volunteer Relief and Mrs. Shook's Groups separately petitioned for membership in the Association of Junior Leagues of America (AJLA). The AJLA recommended that the two groups merge to form the Junior League of Birmingham (JLB). The first meeting was held at South Highland Presbyterian Church.

Early League fundraising efforts created a "convalescent ward for crippled children" at the Children's Hospital. Not a year has since passed without League volunteers serving at the Hospital.



n celebration of our 100th year, the Junior League of Birmingham planned "100 Acts of Service" to our community. Projects varied from feeding our local homeless population to environmental clean up projects, a blood drive, celebrating our local heroes (including emergency department staff and teachers), donating to our local food banks and creating Easter baskets for those families served by these partners.

We collected and distributed children's books to local free Little Libraries and helped pack hundreds of meals with Rise Against Hunger. We built a ramp at a local woman's house to increase her mobility out of the house.

Our premier project was helping a local elementary school clean up its playground and build a baseball field for its school baseball/ mentorship program with an opening day party, where students were given gently used sports supplies also collected from our members.

Between September 1932 and January 1933, the JLB's Salvage Station oversaw the collection and distribution of 17,000 garments and 200 pairs of shoes for families in need.

1930s – The Great Depression



The League paid the salary and transportation costs for Children's Hospital's first medical social worker. Two years later, the JLB and the Public Health Department established a Visiting Nurses Association for people who could not afford the full costs of nursing services.

1935

The JLB saw its first cooperative effort with the City of Birmingham as the League's vibrant children's theater effort supported a production of Peter Pan. The show was seen for free by 2,700 needy children yet still was a financial success.

In the 1940s, the JLB maintained its focus on serving the people of Jefferson County while also contributing to the nation's war effort. League members worked as WAVEs, Red Cross volunteers, and aircraft assemblers. Members volunteered through the USO and, collectively, sold \$400,000 in war bonds. Meanwhile, the League continued to support the work of Children's Hospital, Beulah Moore Day Nursery, and the Neighborhood House, each of which met unique needs of children in wartime Birmingham. Other League members served at the Crippled Children's clinic, and volunteers on the Children's Aid Society Committee worked with the foster-care system.

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
The JLB financed training and salaries for leaders of nine minority Girl Scout troops that had 180 members.

Waldrop sat on the Junior League of Birmingham's executive board as the Resource Development Chair, the precursor to the Fund Development VP. She was familiar with the League's fundraising efforts and realized that there didn't exist a way for members to give significantly as individuals outside of attending events or through corporate donations from their employers. Seeing this missed opportunity, Waldrop envisioned the creation of a "giving society" that would present members the chance to contribute at a higher monetary level. Giving societies provide easy and low maintenance means for nonprofits to raise significant funds that are not currently realized in their fundraising strategies. Waldrop suggested \$1,000 as the required donation level to be included in this new "giving society".

Waldrop shared her fundraising vision with Antique Show leadership, Ellard Coward, Kim Rogers, Sheryl Kimerling, and League leadership. She suggested the name "President's Society" and the group decided to launch this initiative at the 1998 Antiques Show.

Waldrop suggested having a sustainer honorary chair who would host an annual cocktail party for members of President's Society. The inaugural event was a roaring success, honoring and hosted by past president Philippa Bainbridge, and President's Society continues to be a pillar of the JLB's fundraising efforts.

I've been honored to lead this committee for the past three years and have loved seeing how this fundraiser brings our community together.

While some of our fundraisers have had seasons that served our organization well, it is my hope that President's Society will become a permanent part of our Fund Development and will be celebrated at our Bicentennial.

The Junior League School of Speech Correction, Inc. opened at Church of the Advent. The school provided diagnostic and referral services to children and adults, along with conducting 145 such interviews during its first two years.



Speech and Hearing Center. Funding for the school came primarily from the JLB's annual Christmas Eve Caroling program, which began in 1948. From an initial \$600 profit the first year, Christmas Eve Caroling grew into a city-wide project that netted upwards of \$25,000 annually by the mid-1950s.

October 1950

The Junior Programs art series for school-age children grew significantly. A performance of "Peter Rabbit" by the Puppet Committee was seen by more than 7,700 children.

The League's magazine publication, Newsheet, and the Nearly New Shop also grew and remained profitable endeavors supporting the JLB's operations and welfare projects.

After having spent its entire existence in borrowed and leased spaces, the Junior League of Birmingham moved into its own (and current) headquarters at 2212 20th Avenue South.





The first Junior League was founded in 1901 in New York. By 1922, when the Junior League of Birmingham (JLB) was established, 50 other leagues had begun their work in communities around the US. In fact, the Junior League experienced quite a boom in the 1920s, with 70 leagues created during the decade. Thus, centennial celebrations have been on the mind of a lot of league leaders across the country.

Leagues sharing their experiences with other leagues is a great benefit of being a part of the Association of Junior Leagues International (AJLI). The JLB got a head start on its centennial planning, charging an ad hoc committee in 2018 to develop a centennial celebration plan, therefore many leagues had reached out to JLB to share their plan. Aware of the growing outreach and mass of leagues reaching this milestone, Toni Leeth, JLB past president, reached out to AJLI to organize a centennial celebrations panel at the 2022 AJLI Annual Conference. Moira Girard, AJLI Chief Learning Officer agreed: "The more we can elevate and share the great work being done by our leagues, the more we build stronger connections and deeper learning across our association."

Leeth organized and facilitated the panel "Marking the Occasion: Planning Your League's Centennial Celebration." In addition to sharing JLB's plan, the panel featured two other leagues to represent the diversity of geography, league size, and celebration experiences. Margo Goodwin, Centennial Celebrations Co-Chair and former Sustaining President of the Junior League of Dallas (JLD), and Uta Steinhauser, President of the Junior League of Greater Princeton (JLGP), joined Leeth on the panel.

Like JLB, JLD was formed in 1922 and celebrating its centennial in 2022. JLGP's celebrations were to have occurred in 2021 but were postponed to 2022 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The one-hour panel covered a lot of ground—when

and how to get started and who to include in the planning and what elements to consider in planning your league's centennial celebration, including stakeholders, purpose, and funding. The three leaders on the panel shared specific examples of how their leagues planned to mark this major milestone.

The purpose of the Centennial celebration is to raise awareness of the JLB, increasing our circle so that more people know us for our impact and leadership in the community.

Leeth said that, for JLB, all centennial celebration activities, from marketing to events, were connected back to the celebration's purpose "to raise awareness of the JLB, increasing our circle so that more people know us for our impact and leadership in the community." JLB's 100 Acts of Service campaign provided a strong example of engaging the community in the mission of the JLB and creating a platform to tell the JLB's story of 100 years of impact. Goodwin spoke of being intentional to touch on every aspect of what makes the JLD special, from the reach and diversity of its membership to the legacy of contribution to the community. Part of its centennial gift was creating a \$15 million volunteer training endowment for the JLD, to ensure the leadership of JLD members continues well beyond its first century. After a year-long delay due to COVID-19, JLGP celebrated its centennial with a roaring '20s gala and a new fundraiser (President's Circle).

After the presentation, the panelists answered questions from the full room of league leaders and AJLI staff. A league president-elect expressed her appreciation: "We are two years from our centennial, and this session was just what we needed to guide our planning!" At the end of the session, Leeth shared with the group, "One of my favorite parts of any AJLI meeting is connecting to and learning from other leagues. What a privilege to be a part of and learn from a network of smart, inspiring women leading in communities all around the world." "

ow do we celebrate one hundred years of an organization like the Junior League of Birmingham in thirty minutes?

Not easily! There are more than a dozen organizations in Birmingham that trace their roots back to the JLB. There are hundreds of women whose leadership in our community was formed through the training they received as a JLB member. And, there are thousands of lives who have been impacted by the programs and services provided by the JLB. These stories could fill an entire library of film. How do you distill them into 30 minutes?

It started as an idea, like most great JLB projects, around the boardroom table. In the fall of 2018, the Centennial Celebration Steering Committee was brainstorming how the JLB should mark this significant milestone. All ideas centered on the primary goal of raising awareness of the JLB, increasing our circle so that more people know us for our impact and leadership in the community. A film would provide an engaging and farreaching format for telling the JLB story: a bold, relevant and innovative organization creating lasting impact in Birmingham. Having an awardwinning film festival in our own backyard added motivation to solidify the idea as part of the centennial celebration plan.

The JLB partnered with Free Works Productions to bring this idea to reality. As a torchbearer for the JLB's Community of Lights centennial campaign, Jenna Bedsole, founder of Free Works, was familiar with the JLB, but as she researched the league's history to write the script, she grew to understand and appreciate the extent of impact the JLB has had on Birmingham. Bedsole brought into the project Ted Speaker,

an Alabama-native living in California, who, with Toni Leeth, 2020-2021 JLB President, rounded out the film production team.

Work began full steam in January 2021, including hundreds of hours of research, days spent combing through the JLB archives, and numerous phone calls. The JLB auditorium transformed into a film studio for April and early May, capturing on camera the memories of JLB's leaders and community partners, past and present. The hardest part of the project started once filming was complete – editing. Once the film was in a near final version, it was time to tie the story together with narration, and Andrea McCaskey, 2006-2007 JLB President, did so beautifully.

JLB members got a sneak peek of the film at the December 2021 general membership meeting with a two-minute trailer, and the JLB took up residence for two days in May 2022 at the Sidewalk Theater in downtown Birmingham to share the film with members, community partners, corporate sponsors, and other friends of the JLB. The centennial film made its way back to Sidewalk in August 2022, this time as an official selection of the 24th Annual Sidewalk Film Festival and showing at the Birmingham Museum of Art as part of the Alabama Shorts film block. Nearly four years after that brainstorming session around the JLB boardroom table, the dream of sharing JLB's 100 years of impact and service through film and as a part of Birmingham's world-class film festival became reality. ®

The 1980s signified change the JLB. A new headquarters building was constructed and the League championed mobility for the physically handicapped using the Access Linlimited. In honor of our Magic City, the first JLB cookbook titled "Magic" was printed. Now out of print, "Magic" has become a collector's item, often the subject of bidding wars on resale sites like eBay.



The League continued its extensive volunteer work. Members volunteered with the Birmingham/Jefferson County Family Violence Project, the Birmingham Historical Society's Downtown Discovery Tours, The Red Mountain Museum, Birmingham Museum of Art, and the Ruffner Mountain Nature Center.

s a community leader, Volunteer VP Jessica Hightower Hopper believes it is important to balance the involvement of our League members in events like the World Games with our ongoing commitment to our agency's community impact. While the World Games 2022 were an exciting opportunity, we must prioritize our resources to ensure that we continue to make a difference in our community beyond this event.

With consideration for the members' time and efforts, Hopper stated, "While this is a great opportunity to be involved in the World Games, we must still consider the impact on our league members and our agency's overall community impact. We need to carefully assess whether asking our members to take on additional responsibilities for the World Games is feasible and sustainable."

Asking our league members to do 40 hours of training only for the World Games is basically a placement, which is a whole year's worth of work for the League. Hopper raised this rhetorical question: Are we going to ask them to double up and go above and beyond? The World Games coordinators knew the level of our members' training as volunteers, and they asked for our help again within two weeks before the games.



Hopper and the rest of the JLB Executive Board faced a tight deadline with the turnaround of two days to organize volunteer shifts for the World Games as the athletes were arriving a week before the opening games to settle in and adjust to the time difference. They explored several options to organize the volunteer signups, such as using Digital Cheetah or shiftwork signups. However, given the short timeline, the GoogleDoc proved to be the most efficient and user-friendly option. Membership VP Ellen King created a GoogleDoc overnight that was sent out immediately to all our members. Despite the rush, they successfully recruited a large number of volunteers who were eager to contribute to this international event, even with the timeframe clustered around the 4th of July festivities.

Hopper described the phenomenon, "I was in my guest room, looking at the computer watching people fill in the slots. It was a great feeling to see the slots filling up so fast, with over 250 shifts taken in a matter of hours. To show our appreciation, I got on Facebook and tagged people in posts to give them a shoutout every time they signed up. I was overwhelmed by the enthusiastic response, and it was clear that many people, like myself, wanted to showcase the hospitality of Birmingham."

From Hopper's perspective, the World Games team did a great job promoting the events, making everybody excited about welcoming the world to Birmingham. Our volunteers felt that they needed an easy way to volunteer and get engaged. We are honored that the World Games organization saw us with our JLB-trained volunteers as part of the solution. ®



Hopper continued, "We all have different spiritual gifts. And I think one of Kelly's is hospitality. Like a lot of volunteers, Kelly realized this is an opportunity of a lifetime. How many times would anyone get to interact with so many people from different parts of the world? We're talking about athletes at the top of their profession. It is an outstanding opportunity, plus her amazing heart for service and amazing gift of hospitality make the perfect recipe."

Initially, Kelly Wright signed up for volunteer shifts on behalf of the Junior League, but the experience was so captivating that she got completely swept away. Interacting with people from different countries was exhilarating for her, as she enjoyed immersing herself in the energy and pageantry of events. It was a fun and rewarding experience to meet athletes and share meals with them, listening to their stories of perseverance. Even the security team had captivating tales to share, making the whole experience extraordinary. It was the opportunity to connect with people from all over the world that makes the World Games 2022 unforgettable. During this decade, the JLB created the Dottie Haynes Service Award. Working with other community agencies, the JLB was instrumental in creating Voices for Alabama's Children and The Literacy Council of Central AL.

The Association of Junior Leagues International (AJLI) began commemorating many Leagues for their centennial projects and celebration with the founding Junior League of the City of New York leading the way.

In 2001, Birmingham lost wonderful community volunteer Lucille Beeson. Even in her passing, Mrs. Beeson's love for our community was apparent as she established a sizeable trust to benefit 13 charitable organizations, including .II R

The League created its first endowment fund in 2003, with the goal of establishing a greater financial base for the JLB to enable it to provide financial support to our chosen projects and programs, regardless of the money acquired from our fundraisers.

Magic City native, attorney Crystal Smitherman had not heard of the Junior League of Birmingham until the organization came before her and the rest of the Birmingham City Council in 2019.

The JLB's Anti-Human Trafficking Committee was there to ask city leaders to declare Birmingham a "human trafficking free zone."

"It was this group of poised and professional women," said Smitherman. "And I said, 'That's an organization I want to be a part of."

One year later, Birmingham was a Human Trafficking Free Zone and Birmingham City Councilor Crystal Smitherman was a JLB provisional. Now in her second active year, Smitherman is double-placed on the Anti-Human Trafficking and Diversity, Equity and Inclusion committees, president pro-tempore of the Birmingham City Council and continues her "day job" as an attorney in the firm she shares with her father, State Senator Rodger Smitherman.

"I'm very thankful to work under my supportive dad," said Smitherman.

Her mom Carole Smitherman is also an attorney (and former Birmingham city councilor and Birmingham mayor) who now serves as a circuit court judge in Jefferson County.

On the day Crystal Smitherman sat down for her interview with *Newsheet*, she was behind her desk at Smitherman Law Office downtown. With a map of her district behind her, it was evident her identities as a league member, elected official and attorney are deeply intertwined. She often paused this interview to

attend to clients who walked through the door or consult with her dad as he worked on a case. She'd return to her desk and express her hopes and ideas for the city where she was raised, and she was educated in its public schools.

"I'm a product of Birmingham City Schools. I want to continue improving the education system; help our kids become more competitive, give them hope," said Smitherman.

She sees the Junior League of Birmingham as being an integral part in improving education here, pointing to the League's support of Youth Leadership Forum, Girls, Inc., JLB Essentials Pantry and Backpack Buddies. She's also excited to see league members stepping

up to a recent challenge from Birmingham

"It makes me wonder what we can do to keep that going forward," she said.

A fifth generation Titusville-native, Smitherman graduated from Ramsay High School. She went to Hampton University on a golf scholarship and then on to the University of Alabama School of Law. It was while she was in law school that a seat came open on the Birmingham City Council mid-term, and she was appointed—an early glimpse of Smitherman's ability to juggle multiple demanding commitments at once. While she seems to "do it all" flawlessly, she's quick to point out that she too can struggle with self-doubt and "imposter syndrome."

"I think everyone does," said Smitherman, but she reminds herself that her constituents believe in her. "They've elected me twice now. They have faith in me."

During the 2021-2022 League year, Crystal helped with the YouthServe garbage clean up in Titusville. For the 2022-2023 League Year, Second Year Active Smitherman is double-placed as the Diversity, Equity, & Inclusion Chair and JLB Anti-Human Trafficking Volunteer.

She also feels support from her fellow league members.

"I really feel like the Junior League helps me as a person, as Crystal, not just as Councilmember Smitherman or Attorney Smitherman," she said.

As Smitherman looks to increase her footprint as an effective attorney, city councilor and volunteer, she predicts the same for the Junior League


of Birmingham.



he JLB Anti-Human Trafficking Committee is the "anti-human trafficking education sponsor" of The World Games 2022. The committee provided anti-human trafficking training to both TWG 2022 staff and division-lead volunteers. The training was led by JLB volunteers Ellie Friedman and Jessica Keating Hardy. Third Year Active Dorothea Staursky shared in a Facebook post on how the JLB efforts contributed to the success of the World Games Human Exploitation Task Force headed by Homeland Security Investigations: "The JLB played a critical role in the rescue of several victims during The World Games, leading to arrests and lives saved!" Our Anti-Human Trafficking Committee posted these signs, in English and Spanish, in airport, gas station and rest stop bathrooms across Alabama. These displays explain common signs of human trafficking and how to find help. ®



Opening Ceremony

ravel back a hundred years to the 1920 Olympics which took place in Antwerp, Belgium. That year, many new traditions were introduced that would become iconic. Rebuilding after WWI brought

peace, unity, and strength into the forefront. The Olympic flag with five interlocking circles signifying the universality of the Olympic Games and the union of the five continents, was created by Baron de Coubertin, and raised for the first time. The Olympic oath was taken for the first time by an athlete on behalf of all competitors to "respect and abide by the rules" in the true spirit of sportsmanship, and doves were released as a symbol of peace, along with a fanfare of music.

To kick off the year, President Martina Winston wanted to dedicate the September GMM to recognizing the League members who contributed thousands of hours volunteering during The World Games 2022.

Centennial Events Co-Chair Lynn Andrews conceptualized a way to honor the occasion that perfectly aligned with century-old traditions. These traditions inspired the creation of "Centennial Olympics: 100 Years Strong" to celebrate the JLB Centennial and the volunteers who served at The World Games in Birmingham, Alabama.

To recognize the achievements and being 100 Years Strong, the September GMM became the World Games Olympic Opening Ceremony where training, dedication, and sacrifice creates the ultimate volunteer. Unbeknownst to members, the powerful Olympic fanfare filled the room, the World Games volunteers began the Olympic Processional entering with flags representing the nations, including the four countries of the Association of Junior Leagues International—the United States, Canada, the United Kingdom, and Mexico. Similar to the athletes dedicated to their sport, these volunteers are highly committed to their service work, willing to put in the time and effort to make a significant impact on the community of Greater Birmingham.

Once the athletes have all been introduced, the Olympic Flame enters the stadium. A handcrafted Olympic torch was made for this purpose, and Andrews selected former League President Elizabeth Burgess to carry the

Olympic torch into the JLB auditorium as a way to recognize and tie in another significant Centennial moment. Burgess was not only a "torchbearer" for the Community

of Lights Centennial Campaign, but the highest league member fundraiser. Much applause erupted next, as the flame was handed to Winston, who under her leadership would carry the torch into the new league year.

The lights went dark for the final Olympic tradition. Three doves flew through the darkness to symbolize peace. Andrews, Adrienne Moore, and Keaira Turner were dressed in white and adorned in twinkle-lit wings that lit up as they soared through the crowd. Doves were released during the 1920 Olympic Games and have been featured in every opening ceremony since in some artistic way. For example, winged cyclists were lifted up in the air to portray doves flying during London's 2012 Olympics.

With the meeting officially opened, the volunteers were rightfully honored during the GMM for their outstanding dedication and service at The World Games 2022, which took place July 7-17. Kathy Boswell, Executive VP—Community and Volunteer Engagement for The World Games 2022, commended the League and expressed her gratitude for their exceptional service. Boswell had contacted Winston when in need of strong volunteer support in the community. To show her appreciation, on behalf of the World Games, Boswell presented a medal of honor to Winston for the League's exemplary commitment. The presentation of medals was also a tradition that began in 1920 using gold, silver, and bronze to acknowledge the top three finishers.

This event aimed to inspire people by elevating the Olympian spirit, celebrating the JLB Centennial and encouraging members to better Birmingham through volunteering. JLB members may have helped The World Games 2022 finish strong with their efforts, but the JLB Centennial continued with the symbol of a torch-bearing lady named Constance, reflecting Birmingham's iconic Vulcan while honoring the past 100 Years Strong of service. Winston ended the September GMM by declaring, "Let the games begin" to kick off the festivities of volunteering for the Centennial year of the League. ®


















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Community of Lights Torchbearers Campaign

any years ago, the Junior League of Birmingham (JLB) began conversations about how to commemorate its first 100 years in Birmingham. The gift to the City had to be significant and it had to be an accurate representation of who we have been and continue to be as an organization. After much research and discussion, it became clear that the gift had to be inclusive, collaborative, and impactful. In 2015-2016, the JLB decided to engage in a five year fundraising campaign to ultimately donate a minimum of \$1.25 million as the lead gift for a building for One Place Metro Alabama Family Justice Center (One Place). One Place would be a collaborative effort to bring together the resources of the YWCA, the Crisis Center, the Jefferson County District Attorney's office, and the Birmingham Police Department. Together, under one roof, One Place would serve victims of domestic violence and sexual assault.

In addition to the many Community Partners that benefit from the support of JLB throughout the year, the Centennial Gift to the City of Birmingham allows One Place to make resources available to victims and their families all under one roof.

That's a gift that will continue to inspire, educate, and give those in our community the will to lead a productive life, knowing that they are supported.

— Kimberly Grant, Sixth Year Active (2017) Membership Advisor, First Year Actives 2022-2023 In 2017, the JLB launched the Community of Lights campaign by selecting 20 people from across the community to raise a minimum of \$10,000 each from their network. Each year, the 20 Torchbearers selected were from diverse backgrounds and experiences in hopes that their efforts would not only raise money for One Place, but also raise awareness of the work being done by the JLB. At the conclusion of each year, the Torchbearers passed their torches to someone of their choosing, continuing to expand the reach of this fundraising and friendraising campaign. At the conclusion of the campaign, 101 Torchbearers raised \$1.34 million through the donations of over 6,500 individuals.

Lindsey Tanner, five-time Chair of the Community of Lights Campaign, reflects on this campaign by saying, "I loved watching this campaign come to life. What started as an idea on a cocktail napkin became a campaign that empowered 101 people to raise

money and awareness for this organization. The inclusive way it brought together the passion, energy, and impact of the Junior League and this community is the legacy that we leave with this 100th year gift and celebration."

During 2022, One Place moved into their new location at 3613 6th Avenue South and immediately began serving victims of domestic violence and sexual assault. Members of the JLB have further enhanced the relationship and success of One Place by serving on its Advisory Board. One Place, the Crisis Center, the Jefferson County District Attorney's office, the Birmingham Police Department, and the JLB celebrated the success of the campaign and this relationship by cutting the ribbon at the building on the 13th of April 2022.

This \$1.34 million gift to One Place is the largest single gift ever made by the Junior League of Birmingham. ®

For some members, they grew up with a tradition of giving back to the community and making a difference. Such tradition may involve the Junior League of Birmingham, an organization that has been changing lives in the Greater Birmingham and surrounding areas for over a century. And for one woman, being part of the League is a family tradition that is greatly treasured.

The granddaughter, daughter, sister, and niece of Junior League members, Lynn Martin-Hobbie Andrews cherishes being third generation and part of the legacy of an organization that has been at the forefront of community service and volunteerism for decades. When her mother was a docent at the zoo, Andrews has fond memories accompanying her and helping at the petting zoo, as well as attending other events. It was a way for Andrews, and her sister Elizabeth-Lee, to spend time with their mother while also contributing to the community. As a child, she looked up to them with admiration and could not wait until she was old enough to join the Junior League herself.

Birmingham native Andrews moved to New York City after college, and that is where she began her league career. While in New York, she had the privilege of serving on the Centennial Committee for the New York Junior League, the original Junior League founded in 1901. At such a young age, it was an incredible honor for Andrews to be part of such a historical endeavor, surrounded by and working alongside the women who had been the backbone of the NYJL.

It was never Andrews' intention to walk away from the League—her heart was drawn to serve in a different way after losing her father to terminal brain cancer. Serving on mission trips in memory of her father, parlayed into traveling and living overseas for almost three years, making it impossible to complete her ten-year term. However, her desire to be part of the organization never wavered.

"For several years, I have wanted to rejoin the League and complete the commitment I started in NYC. Unexpectedly, on the first anniversary of my mother's passing, I was invited to the JLB Choral Group Dress Rehearsal, which happened to be at the league headquarters. After the performance, I was completely moved, brought to tears even, and decided that day, I would reinstate and transfer my membership serving in memory of my mother in the league where she was a member. I also grew up singing with my mother and have fond memories of sitting at the piano as we sang together, and I turned the pages."

That day, Andrews made a decision that changed her life. Rejoining the league was something that members including Shelley Gentle and Ginny Webb had encouraged her to do for years. It was quite serendipitous. A member from her church, and a league Sustainer, invited Lynn to the JLB Choral Group performance so she would not be alone on the anniversary of her mother's passing. It was that day that after being moved by the spirit that everything aligned. As she was leaving the performance, the President of the League Becky Holt happened to be at the reception desk and said, "We can get you transferred today."

The timing could not have been more perfect. Not only is Andrews now a member of the JLB Choral Group, but she aspired to be part of a second Centennial Celebration.

"Serving and giving back has always been important to me. Truly the heart behind why I am a member of JLB. Furthermore, while a member in NY, I had the honor and privilege of serving on the Centennial Committee for three years, planning and bringing to life the historic year-long celebrations of the first Junior League. An experience I will always cherish and consider an accomplishment. And the inspiration behind my great desire to have the opportunity to be a part of my second Centennial Celebration—this time in my 'home' league where my sister and I grew up volunteering with our mother. It was truly a dream come true—having the opportunity to honor the women who, no matter what the challenges, built the foundation that we stand upon today."

For Andrews, the Junior League is more than an organization. It is a way of life. As a member of the Junior League of Birmingham, she finds immense pride in being part of an organization that has dedicated itself to this noble cause for more than a century.

The League is a platform to create a ripple effect of positivity that extends far beyond individual efforts. It is an opportunity to continue a legacy of service, inspire others to join in, and leave a legacy that endures for generations to come. 1

Grace Klein Community (GKC) operates two food assistance drive-thru sites, while resourcing six additional sites, seven days a week, reaching 41 of the 67 Alabama Counties in 2022 with food support. GKC rescues good and healthy food, that would otherwise be sent to a landfill, and instead places the food in the hands of low-income families who experience food insecurity. In 2022, GKC performed over 10,423 pick-ups rescuing over 2 million pounds of donated food, purchased an additional 138,450 pounds of food, distributed the food in 228,051 food boxes, in collaboration with our 162 community partners, and reached approximately 98,062 people with food support.

The Junior League of Birmingham continues to provide core support to Grace Klein Community in its efforts to care for the people of Alabama. With a contribution of \$12,825 and 735 hours of volunteer champion support, at our drive-thru sites and as food rescue heroes, the JLB has been pivotable to community impact for the food insecure.







sentennial Recipes

INGREDIENTS

- 8 oz. of Feta Cheese
- 3/4 whole-fat Greek yogurt
- I tbsp extra virgin olive oil kosher salt and black pepper to taste

METHOD

- Add feta, greek yogurt, and olive oil to a food processor. Puree for 4–5 minutes until creamy.
- Add kosher salt and pepper to taste and puree until fully incorporated.
- Serve as desired can be refrigerated for up to 2 days.





INGREDIENTS

- 1 (750) bottle of champagne, dry sparkling wine

 1 cup of elderflower liqueur, like St.
- Germain
- 1 12 oz. can of club soda or seltzer water
- 1 cup of sliced strawberries

METHOD

- In a large pitcher, combine chilled ingredients.
- Mix well.
- Serve immediately.

MOCKTAIL

- 3 cups of club soda or seltzer water
- 1 bottle elderflower tonic, chilled
- 1/4 cup strawberry simple syrup
- 1 cup of sliced strawberries

INGREDIENTS

- 2 cups crispy corn snacks (Bugles)
 2 cups rice cereal (Rice Chex)
 2 cups bite-size white cheddar crackers
- 1 cup mini pretzels
- 6 tbsp unsalted butter
- 2 tsp chipotle chili powder
- 1 tsp smoked paprika, salt, and garlic

METHOD

- Preheat oven to 325 F degrees. Toss crunchy ingredients in a large bowl.
- Melt butter in a small saucepan, stirring in the seasonings. Drizzle over snack mixture and toss to coat.
- Spread mixture in a single layer on a rimmed baking sheet lined with parchment paper. Bake for 10 to 12 minutes.


















